

We are gearing up for World War II Heritage Day on Oct. 8th and Jane Simpson and her team could use more volunteers. This would be a wonderful event for you to serve our veterans and community.





Col Willard Womack and Johnny review notes for WWII Heritage Days, to be held on October 8th.

U.S. Navy Aviator Survival Kit - M-592 Pack

One of our most unusual items discovered while reviewing the inventory in our museum trailer is the survival kit for naval aviators fighting in the Pacific

theater. It was designed to be worn under their parachutes and life vests, and for that reason, it was very uncomfortable and awkward to wear while flying. For these reasons, only 40,000 were produced in 1944. At least, that is what we were able to determine from what little can be found on the internet about this object. We can determine the items that should be in the pack, based on the instruction booklet (with an attached pencil!) inside the pack. Our pack is in fair condition, and includes a poncho, mosquito head net, machete, cans of water and sardines, a fishing net, a signal mirror, a whistle, flint, and a few other items. It may have been uncomfortable to wear, but one has to wonder - was it ever used to save a downed aviator?





Currently, we have this pack displayed beneath the U.S.S. Enterprise model, which seems to be an appropriate location!





Once Upon A Time An Inaugural

Flight Was Taken On A Beechcraft T-34

This flight was the effort by two stalworth Colonels from CAF-Airbase Georgia. *Colonels James J. Dalton*, retired USMC Officer, and Pilot and brother *Colonel Brian J Dalton*, retired USAF Officer, and Pilot. Both gentlemen asked for and were granted permission to undertake this flight as the aircraft involved had never been to EAA Airventure, Oshkosh, Wisconsin. Now it must be noted these flights are not just a major effort by pilots but the efforts of the Perfectly Splendid Volunteers who devote their time and efforts to maintain the aircraft located at the Wing in Peachtree City, GA.



The Volunteers at Airbase Georgia undertake such important and necessary tasks such as Maintenance, Logistics, Administrative Issues, Security and too many additional items too lengthy to mention here. Safe to say these are essential personnel and all professionals. So off they pilots went in the sky-blue yonder!

A little history here. The usual iconic aircraft visiting Airventure from Airbase Georgia are typically great old Warbirds such as a P-51 Mustang, a Dauntless Dive Bomber SBD perhaps a Corsair, very rare P-63 King Cobra, maybe a T-6 Texan. These are crowd pleasing and extremely interesting airplanes just to look at when called upon to display their abilities to preform aerobatics during their time at the event.







Well just think the little Yellow Bird pictured above is capable of the same activities, hence Trainer. The Rides Aircraft this year (as always) were based at the General Aviation Airport in Fond du Lac, Wisconsin.

The Dalton brothers were convinced the T-34 would be a valued addition to the other aircraft and their efforts to fly, display and provide rides was a complete success. In 7 days, attendance this aircraft provided 17 rises to folks at the event. My mention of these does not tell the entire story. These two Pilots and ancillary CAF Volunteers would take the time to acknowledge the spectators who just showed up to see the airplanes. All CAF personnel would take the time to (especially) engage the younger generation kids in conversation.

One situation comes to mind. After returning from a flight an older couple, later identified as grandparents of two great kids about 8-9 and 4-5 years of age. Col. JJ came over to the fence and talked with the kids. Grandma would be there advising the kids to ask what kind of airplane it was, how fast did it fly and was it fun to fly. Each question was answered with a child in mind. In other words, language the kids understood and enjoyed! A little later it was learned Grandma and Grandpa were raising these two children as their single mom had died of cancer at 40 years of age. Can you imagine taking on such a responsibility? The Grandparents were obviously in their late 60's early 70's. It was also apparent they did not have the where withal to afford a ride in one of our airplanes. They were to relay the kids were always interested in visiting airports just to see airplanes landing and taking off.







So, imagine their interest when they were able to see rare airplanes at Fond du Lac. As they were leaving Grandma came back to purchase a couple of T-Shirts. I truly believe if they had not been regaled by CAF individuals they would have walked away without their purchase.

I believe this was just one example of CAF folks talking to and taking the time to explain to on-lookers what CAF what is about plus is undertaken to maintain the aircraft in attendance at the event. JOB DESCRIPTIONS

- **1. EXECUTIVE OFFICER** The Executive Officer is the assistant Unit Leader and will act in his place during his absence. The XO should have similar qualities as the Unit Leader:
- · Background in military or business management
- · Present a good public appearance
- · Adept at public speaking
- · A positive demeanor
- · Preferably have a background in aviation

Specific duties include:

- · Current knowledge of CAF rules and regulations
- · Meeting facilities
- · Wing socials
- · Other duties as assigned by the Unit Leader
- 2. ADJUTANT The Adjutant shall record and maintain the permanent minutes of all Unit Staff meetings. He shall maintain suitable correspondence files concerning the business and activities of the Unit and assure that all required Unit reports are submitted to CAF Headquarters in a timely fashion. Further he shall assist the Unit in the timely preparation and dissemination of such correspondence of a general nature. In coordination with the Finance Officer, he shall maintain the Unit personnel records. He shall advise the Headquarters' Membership Department of any changes of the Unit membership, an on a semi-annual (March and July) basis provide a roster of Unit members for verification and updating.
- **3. OPERATIONS OFFICER** Minimum qualifications for Operations Officer, per CAF policy, include all those required for Unit Leader plus a general or military aviation background. If the Unit has one or more CAF assigned aircraft, it is recommended that he be a CAF-rated pilot with a basic knowledge of CAF flight operations, including airshows and static displays, and the safety requirements and special considerations of each. He should also be well versed in the Aircraft Sponsorship Program.

Specific duties include:

- · Authorizing all flights of Unit assigned aircraft
- · Operation of ground equipment
- · Verification of pilot and crew member currency in FAA and CAF ratings and status
- · Serving as Chairman of the Unit Flight Evaluation Board
- · Assignment of pilot and crew members for Unit aircraft missions

He will maintain communications with Headquarters through the Chief Aviation Officer

4. MAINTENANCE OFFICER – The Maintenance Officer should be a Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) licenses Airframe and Powerplant (A&P) or an inspector of Airworthiness (IA)

Specific duties include:

- · Proper care and maintenance of all aircraft and ground equipment assigned to the Unit.
- · Scheduling and directing the restoration of all CAF aircraft assigned to the Unit.
- · Oversight of activities of Unit aircraft project officers.
- · Clearances of all restoration work with CAF Director of Maintenance prior to implementation.
- · Clearance of all planned expenditures through Airbase Georgia Staff.
- · Ensuring that All Airbase Georgia aircraft in airworthy condition prior to flight.
- · Maintaining proper technical manuals, records, and logbooks.
- · Approving ordering of parts and supplies for the Maintenance department by maintenance personnel.
- · Ensure an Airbase Georgia expense/reimbursement form is properly filled out and forwarded to the Finance Officer for all disbursements.
- · Training aircraft crew chiefs and personnel who operate/use ground equipment.
- · Submitting a monthly maintenance and/or restoration report to CAF Hindquarters through the officer of Chief Aviation Officer.

(Oshkosh 2022) are still being tabulated, the pilots and crew at Oshkosh worked long hours to complete approximately 55 rides and generating approximately \$67,000.00 (gross) for Airbase Georgia.

Coming very soon is our WWII Day (October 8th) we will be conducting rides all day. Remember, Airbase Georgia members receive a 20% discount on one ride per year.

Planning has started for WWII Weekend, Reading PA, and Air Venture (Oshkosh) for 2023.

We will be looking for additional volunteers who will be trained for these and other events throughout 2023. Trained rides personnel are among the few who may be authorized to ride in the backseat of our rides aircraft to events where rides will be

The Stearman project team continues to make impressive progress with the restoration. The father and son team of Cols Malcolm and Geoff Lelliott, along with Col Joe Broker, have made great strides with the fuselage. The damaged lower birdcage has been repaired, and now all of the birdcages are installed. The main electrical panel and the radio box have also been installed and Malcom has been working hard to get everything wired up.

Bob thought it would be a great way to build community awareness of the project and Airbase Georgia, as well as **provide** the general public the opportunity to see the aircraft up close."

It turns out he was right because the float (see page 1) won the Mayor's Trophy! I hope everyone will join me in congratulating Bob and the entire *Stearman* team!

Military History Speakers Lead Lineup for WWII Heritage Day

Aviation research and development during WWII served as the launchpad for the space age that followed. Commemorative Air Force (CAF) Airbase Georgia will feature both eras with a series of speakers selected to highlight the dawn of the space age, as part of World War II Heritage Day Oct. 8, 2022. The one-day event at Atlanta Regional Airport – Falcon Field in Peachtree City, Ga., will offer visitors an opportunity to explore this important historical transition and enjoy a vintage car show, costume contest, warbird rides, demonstrations, food vendors and a 1940s victory dance.



Vintage Jeeps and other displays were part of WWII Heritage Day in 2021. This year's event theme is "Dawn of the Space Age," an era that was built on research and development from WWII.

The day-time activities run from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m., followed by a celebration swing dance in the hangar, with music until 7 p.m. All events will

take place at the CAF Airbase Georgia headquarters, 1200 Echo Ct., Peachtree City, Ga. Visitors are encouraged to dress in their favorite World War II or space-age attire to enjoy the day and the dance and to be eligible for costume contest prizes.

Lt. Gen. Brian Arnold (Ret.) is the keynote speaker, focusing on the advances in technology from WWII to the space age. He served in the U.S. Air Force for more than 30 years, as a pilot and in positions related to space and missile systems. Gen. Arnold also will have a simulated conversation with a WWII pilot from the past to

discuss advances in navigation, communication, and weather prediction in aviation. The pilot will be played by a National History Day state winner, Jonathan Dorminy.

Dr. Scott Norman, Director of Educational Services Columbus for State University's Coca-Cola Space Science will discuss the aviation technology transition in his presentation, "From the V-2 to Yuri Gagarin - the Origins of the Space Race". He has been with the Space Science Center for 25 years and has a life-long interest in the space program and aviation.

A noted author will address the history of the famous Tuskegee Airmen. Dr. Daniel L. Haulman is author of "The Tuskegee Airmen – An Illustrated History", and "The Tuskegee Airmen Chronology". He worked at the Air Force Historical Research Agency at Maxwell Air Force Base for 37 years, retiring in 2019 as head of the organization's organizational histories section. He is the author of eight aviation history books and was selected by the Air Force Historical Foundation for its prestigious Dr. I. B. Holley award, recognizing a lifetime of achievement in the documentation of Air Force history.

WWII Days Speakers (Cont.)

Dr. Robert B. Kane will speak about the unique topic of training thousands of Royal Air Force (RAF) cadets at U.S. Army Air Forces flight schools in the Southeast United States from June 1941 through February 1943. He spent 27 years in the Air Force, retired as a lieutenant colonel, and held a variety of information management, personnel management, education, and command positions at Air Force installations. He became an Air Force historian in 2005 and served as a staff historian at the Air Armament Center, Eglin Air Force Base, Fla. and the Air Force Historical Research Center, Maxwell AFB, Ala., including service as Chief Historian for Air University, Maxwell AFB. Dr. Kane has published "So Far from Home - Royal Air Force and Free French Flight Training in Central Alabama during World War II"; "Disobedience and Conspiracy in the German Army, 1918-45"; and co-authored "Cradle of Airpower: A Pictorial History of Maxwell Air Force Base, 1918-2018."

WWII Heritage Day is the oldest and largest WWII and 1940s-themed event in Georgia. This year's

event will feature World War II aircraft, military vehicles, food trucks, living history displays and presentations. The programs will recognize how America recovered from the war and used promising new technology to usher in what is commonly referred to as "The Space Age". Atomic energy, science fiction, space exploration, computing and automation were some of the prevailing interests of this era.

Admission is \$10 for adults, \$5 for ages 11-17. Children 10 and under are free. Advance tickets are available online at https://airbasegeorgia.org/. Visitors who stay for the hangar dance will be able to buy snacks and beverages.

As Development Officer, one of my priorities is to support member engagement and project success by assisting members in building plans and teams to implement and sustain their individual projects. Together we can demonstrate to the business, civic and education communities that the CAF Airbase Georgia is a resource that impacts the quality of life in Fayette County and throughout Georgia. Establishing a positive reputation, track record and relationship building are key to all future fundraising success.



Over the last 35 years, CAF Airbase Georgia members have successfully restored rare and iconic aircraft that are today flying as a tribute to America and her veterans. The SBD Dauntless, P-63 and LT-6 were all restored in Peachtree City. P-51 "Red Nose", T-34 and the Corsair are all operational. This year we have accepted stewardship of a rare Republic P-47N Thunderbolt. The "Jug" joins the N2S *Stearman* and PT-19 Cornell in the workshop. When the P-47 restoration is completed, the aircraft could well be only of only 5 Thunderbolts flying in the world.

The CAF mission is to Educate, Inspire and Honor. To that end, we must demonstrate to our neighbors in Peachtree City, Fayette County and throughout Georgia our mission can impact quality of life, from educating students seeking careers in aviation to communities seeking to preserve our nation's history.
