Col Musick Receives Wright Brothers Award

Col Stan Musick of the Commemorative Air Force Airbase Georgia recently received the Wright Brothers' Master Award from the Federal Aviation Authority (FAA), recognizing more than 50 years of piloting aircraft safely. The prestigious award was presented by Al Van Lengen from the FAA.



The Wright Brothers' Master Pilot Award is widely considered the most prestigious award the FAA presents to pilots, specifically recognizing senior aviators who, as safety-minded professionals, have contributed more than 50 years to piloting aircraft. It is named after brothers Orville and Wilbur Wright, the designers, builders and pilots of the world's first powered airplane - the Wright Flyer that first flew at Kitty Hawk, NC., on Dec. 17, 1903.


FREEZE WARNING/PRECAUTIONS

When closing up the facility this time of year, we need to be sure to leave the heat "ON" and set to 50F to prevent freeze up of the domestic water and automatic fire sprinkler systems. Even if it's warm in the afternoon, temperatures at night can drop below freezing.

Heat in the Shop is controlled by two Honeywell "classic" dial type thermostats (Right). If you turn the dial all the way counterclockwise (down) you'll hear a "click". In this position the heat is OFF and will not run. Turn it just a bit clockwise (up) to just under 50F and the thermostat will be in "freeze protection" mode.



Heat in the Hangar is controlled by a single Emerson thermostat (see left). If you turn it all the way to the left, you will also hear a



Heat in the Meeting Room is controlled by two electronic Honeywell thermostats (see right). Set them to "Heat" and 50F

Please contact the Safety Engineer if you have any questions, comments, or suggestions.

Col Bill Whithouse

William "Bill" Whitehouse 76, boarded his jet airliner on October 17, 2023 to his final destination but this time Jesus was the Captain and Bill the passenger. Bill passed away from Alzheimer's surrounded by his family and caregiver at

The Bradford Memory Care in Humble, TX.

Bill was born July 3, 1947 in Fort Wayne, IN. He moved to Fort Lauderdale, FL when he was 12 years old and after graduating from high school joined the United States Air Force to "see the world." However, he was based at Homestead AFB, just 50 miles from home. After leaving the Air Force he went to school and became an A&P mechanic, earned his pilot's license, and graduated from Embry Riddle Aeronautical University.

In October 1985, Bill landed his "dream job" as a pilot flying for Piedmont Airlines. Being the most senior in his class, his classmates referred to him as the 'old man'. With a gregarious and congenial personality, it wasn't long before he became a pilot everyone wanted to fly with. Those lucky enough to get to fly with him will forever remember how his smile and laughter always filled the room and what a jokester he was. Being a proud member of the Piedmont Silver Eagles, his legacy lives on in the hearts of his extended Piedmont family who sends heartfelt condolences to all.

Bill retired after 20 years of flying at USAir before starting the next chapter in his illustrious career. Bill had always been interested in finance and his nephew, Jim Smothers, worked at Edward Jones in TX. After talking to Jim, Bill decided that he was not ready to retire and became an Edward Jones Financial Advisor in Sharpsburg, GA in 2004. When Bill was ready to finally retire, Jim moved to GA and took over his office.

Bill lived in Peachtree City for 30 years. He had many, many friends due to his personality and big laugh. He never met a stranger. He spent his retirement days traveling the world and when he was home spent his mornings having coffee at McDonalds or in Senoia. He also volunteered at the Commemorative Air Force at Falcon Field in Peachtree City.

Most of all, Bill loved his family and was devoted to his wife, 2 sons and 4 granddaughters. He is survived by his wife of 49 years, Jo-Ann, his son Will and his wife Jessica, his son Drew, granddaughters Amelie, Claire, Elise, Reagan and his sister Marcia Holthaus and many cousins, nieces, and nephews.

A special thank you goes to the friends that supported him through this long illness.

We will be having a "Celebration of Life" for Bill at Christ Our Shepherd Lutheran Church. 101 N Peachtree Pkwy, Peachtree City, GA 30269. Saturday November 4, 2023 at 2 pm. He lived life to the fullest and I hope people will share those "memorable and unique" Bill Whitehouse stories. This month we celebrated 80 years of service by our PT-19A, serial number 42-83511. It was accepted by the United States Army Air Corps on 16 November, 1943. As the aircraft continues into its 81st year we are transitioning from cosmetic restoration to mechanical readiness. Most painting is complete; at this writing only the red borders of the insignia remain to be completed. The major structural work remaining is to fit the canopy pieces and permanently mount the wings to the aircraft. As this structural work is winding down, we are starting the standard annual



inspection required of all aircraft. This will shortly bring us to starting the engine for the first time in almost two years and testing systems for return to flight. Please review the anniversary video on social media and the recent press release for more photos and history details.

Stearman Update Col Jeff Clark




Just a quick Stearman update this month. We have ordered and received a set of tubes and tires (left).



The team has cleaned, primed, and painted the wheels in preparation to mount the tires. Work on the wings continues (below).

We are fortunate that CAF HQ has selected our Stearman once again to participate in Twelve Planes of Christmas. This year, we are seeking to raise \$10,000 for

avionics and instrumentation. As part of this campaign, a very generous Airbase Georgia colonel has offered a \$2,800 matching grant towards a cockpit instrument package. The facility rental season is winding down and only one hangar event remains, that being the anniversary celebration for Airbase Georgia's own Jim and Virginia Dalton on December 28. Revenue from this season's activity currently stands at \$33,800, up approximately \$3,000 from last year.

Delta hosts a Veterans Day Celebration each year where Airbase Georgia is honored to bring all of the flying fleet in support.



The "Muroc Maru" was a life-sized replica of a Japanese Atago-class heavy cruiser, built at Muroc AAF (now Edwards AFB) in 1943 to serve as a training target. Constructed of wood and layered with chicken feathers over chicken wire and tar paper, it was designed to resemble an authentic warship.


