Safety Update

OCTOBER IS "FIRE PREVENTION SAFETY" MONTH

Fire Prevention Safety Month is held every October, and commemorates the Great Chicago Fire of 1871, which killed more than 250 people, left 100,000 homeless, and destroyed more than 17,400 buildings. This year, Fire Prevention Week is 6-12 OCT and the theme focuses on smoke alarms.

At the Airbase we have 100% coverage of the facility with a wet-pipe automatic sprinkler system. In addition, there is heat detection in the Shop and Hangar and smoke detection in the Electrical Rooms. All of these are connected to a 24-hour monitoring central station and they also sound alarms inside and outside the building.

Most of us are not fortunate enough to have such robust fire protection at home, but there is an important step that you can take and that is to ensure you have adequate working smoke and carbon monoxide detectors in your home!

• Almost **3 of every 5** home fire deaths resulted from fires with no smoke alarms or no working smoke alarms (NFPA)

• Carbon monoxide is the **#1 cause of accidental poisoning** in the US (CDC)

• Unattended cooking is the **#1 cause of home fires** (NFPA)

• A fire department responds to a fire every **23 seconds** in America (NFPA)

As the cold weather sets in we'll see the perennial news reports of fires started in homes and typically they report that "there were no working smoke detectors," and usually with casualties as a result.

You should practice good fire safety behaviors at home, work and at the Airbase! Many things you do every day can raise or lower the risk of a fire in your home or work areas:

• It's getting chilly out! Keep all portable heaters at least three (3) feet away from flammable items (these are NOT permitted at Airbase Georgia without written approval from Safety).

• Turn off space heaters before leaving a room, even if you will be gone only a short time.

• Do not overload electrical circuits, such as wall outlets and extension cords - use a circuit (power) strip. All extension cords at Airbase Georgia must be unplugged and put away when not in use.

• Candles and other "open flames" of any kind are NOT permitted at Airbase Georgia. Use with caution at home and don't leave them unattended.

•Do not run electrical cords under rugs, carpet, or furniture at home.

Safety Update (cont.)

- Know how to handle and store chemicals (utilize flammable storage cabinets at Airbase Georgia).
- Know your chemical properties (check the SDS for flammable/combustible information).
- Do not block fire extinguishers and exit routes with clutter or equipment.

At the end of a line of modern corporate and private jets parked at Hawthorne Global Aviation Services, the trainer from Commemorative Air Force (CAF) Airbase Georgia was a welcome sight to many as they wandered through the flight line.
