### Heroes of Aviation Submitted By Col Casey Roszell

### Sam Folsom

Sam Folsom, born July 24, 1920 in Quincy, Massachusetts, was one of the first echelon of 17 Marine fighter pilots with Marine Fighter Squadron 121 tasked with defending Guadalcanal.

Sam Folsom became interested in aviation after hearing of the exploits of Charles Lindbergh. Folsom never intended to join the Marines. He was commissioned a Navy ensign upon graduation from the Massachusetts Maritime Academy in 1940, but was denied a request to enter flight training – the entire reason he had wanted to join the military.

"I always wanted to fly," he said. "I don't know why. It was just something I always wanted to do since I was a kid.

He elected to vacate his commission, choosing to join the Marines, who agreed to send him into aviation training. He was sent to Jacksonville Naval Air Station, where as a cadet he learned to fly the Grumman F3F-2 biplane.

He would spend the next 17 years on active duty.

Folsom completed training at the end of 1942. Promoted to the rank of second lieutenant in the Marine Corps Aviation Reserve. He received orders to Miramar, California, where he checked into his new unit, VMF-122. Later, the squadron was combined with another to form VMF-121. Folsom's assigned fighter plane was a Grumman F4F Wildcat which he trained in for months before his unit was sent overseas to New Caledonia briefly, before being sent to Guadalcanal in early September, 1942. The conditions of training were very difficult, mainly due to the lack of aircraft: the entire group of pilots, totalling 80, had only 20 F4F-3/4 Wildcats between them. Before setting off to war, Folsom managed to gain no more than 25 hours flight time on the fighter (in all, he had some

250 hours flying experience). Many of his colleagues had even less luck, however, having trained for only a dozen so hours on the Wildcat.

Sam Folsom had never flown an airplane above 10,000 feet and only once fired the weapons on the F4F Wildcat fighter he would soon pilot into combat when he arrived on Guadalcanal in September 1942.

The battle for the strategic, jungle-covered South Pacific island was raging, as Folsom and the bulk of his inexperienced fighter squadron VMF-121 joined the operation. They were tasked with finding and destroying Japanese G4M medium bombers – known as "Betty Bombers" – that had been wreaking havoc on American troops on their first major offensive in the Pacific theater during World War II. Just days after reaching

Guadalcanal, Fols found himself piloting his Wildcat upward of 25,000 feet when a formation of Japanese A6M Zero fighters and Betty Bombers approached. When they dived down to attack Folsom lost control. After recovering and regaining control, he maneuvered his fighter into position, moving onto the tail of an enemy plane to line up the sights for the six M2 .50-caliber machine guns mounted on his Wildcat's wings. He pulled the trigger. "Nothing happened," Folsom's

squadron had covered its guns in lubricant before he took off, but at altitude the coating froze, rendering the machine guns useless. It would happen twice more to Folsom and dozens of additional times to his squadron mates before the unit realized the cause. Due to the lack of flying experience at this altitude the unit didn't realize that lubricating the weapons before flying would freeze the lubricant at this high of an altitude. "I never remember being frightened," he said. "Just mad as hell going through this with your life on the line and having my guns not firing."

Folsom and the other pilots had to return to base considering the conditions of their weapons. Towards the end of the squadron's tour, the pilots received more experience flying in support of combat operations than they ever did through their training.

Later, Folsom and his squadron had found themselves above another bomber formation. The bombers had already attacked and were returning home when Folsom dove from some 20,000 feet to near the ocean's surface and shot down two Betty Bombers within minutes of each other. "I closed in on two Japanese bombers, one of which was directly in my sights and I shot him down," Folsom said. "I pulled over to the side and I shot down the other one. It was just like a training exercise." he does not recall any fanfare. "It's nothing, you just do it," he said.

Eventually, Folsom was completely out of ammunition and flew back to base. The Japanese fighter planes escorting the bombers closed in on Folsom. Folsom found himself in a dogfight without any means of defense. His plane was shot multiple times, but he still managed to escape and make it back to base. Folsom said that wasn't the only time he found himself in a dogfight without ammunition.

He recalled at least three incidents in which his Wildcat was shot up badly by Japanese Zeros, enemy fighters that were faster and more agile than his F4F.

In one such incident, Folsom was chased by three or four of the enemy fighters. He maneuvered in and out of cloud cover hoping unsuccessfully to lose his Japanese pursuers. Then the bullets started to fly. Dozens of them pierced the metal shell of his Wildcat. One struck him in the leg, another hit the plane's throttle level, separating it from the panel connecting it to the flight deck.

"They shot the hell out of me," Folsom said. Somehow he managed to land his fighter, leaving him shaken. "I was lucky. Don't misunderstand me – it's not a question of bravery, of anything like that. You just automatically say, 'I've got to land the damn airplane. I'm going to do it.' And then you do it. That's all." Cont.

He recalls the successes just as matter-of-factly.



Folsom was among the last surviving men to have piloted a Marine aircraft in the Battle of Guadalcanal, a decisive victory for the Allied forces in the Pacific and widely considered a turning point in the campaign against the Japanese. To the best of his knowledge, Folsom said, he is the last living member of his fighter squadron, a team of 40 pilots that lost 17 in the three months it spent on island. Överall, the Allied forces lost 7,100 men; Japan casualties were 31,000.

The fight was difficult. His squadron lived in tents near Henderson Field, the key airstrip

After his three-month tour in Guadalcanal he was transferred to Samoa, ending his time with VMF-121. During Folsom's time with VMF-121 he was awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross and the Purple Heart for his actions in Guadalcanal. In total, he shot down two Japanese Betty Bombers and a D3A Type 99 Val. He finished the war flying F4U Corsairs over Okinawa, and then in Korea, providing cover for the Marines at Chosin Reservoir. He continued his career in the Marine Corps and served nearly 18 years and retired from the service in 1960 as a lieutenant colonel. He was hired in an executive position at Pan American World Airways and eventually settled into a long real estate career in New York City.

Seventy-six years after Guadalcanal, Folsom admits he does not remember his days swooping through the clouds over the South Pacific as well as he once did. Those memories, he said, sometimes feel like dreams. "You no longer have any touch with really something that went on 70, that was built by the Japanese and completed by U.S. Navy Seabees after Marines stormed the island in the offensive that caught the enemy by surprise. Though Folsom insists the conditions could have been much worse, he acknowledged that aviators often went without hot food and basic supplies were in heavy demand. Uniforms and clothing, he said, were so scarce that Marines would raid the quarters of their comrades who were shot down or went missing.

"We had a shortage," he said. "It wasn't heartless. Don't misunderstand me – it's just that it happened. People didn't make it. A lot of people didn't make it. It was war."

Sam Folsom passed away on November 13, 2022, one day after the 80th anniversary of his victory over Japanese bombers over Guadalcanal.

80 years ago. It's gone. I must have dreamed that. But I didn't.



### 12 Planes of Christmas Update, Col Chris Madrid, Development Officer

**GREAT NEWS:** Airbase Georgia's P-47N *Thunderbolt* reached its Goal Thanks to Ray Foundation Grant. Members Encouraged to Support Stretch Goal and Stearman Project

For the third consecutive year, Commemorative Air Force (CAF) Airbase Georgia has met its goals for the annual 'Twelve Planes of Christmas' fundraising program to help restore its Republic P-47N *Thunderbolt* fighter. The online campaign has raised \$11,200 to date for the P-47N. The addition of a \$50,000 grant from the Ray Foundation pushed donations over the original \$50,000 goal, helping ensure the purchase of rims and new leading edges for the wings for the rare and historic aircraft.

"This fundraising campaign is essential in helping us restore the *Thunderbolt*," said Airbase Leader Joel Perkins. "We sincerely thank all of the individual donors this year, and especially the Ray Foundation for its continued generous support of what will be a beautiful example of an iconic World War II fighter. We have now set a stretch goal of \$70,000 with 11 days left in the 2024 campaign."

The Ray Foundation, Inc. was co-founded by James C. Ray, a distinguished World War II pilot who believed that American youth could benefit from the lessons learned in aviation.

When completed, the P-47N will be one of 13 *Thunderbolts* flying in the world. The P-47N is one of the original aircraft acquired by CAF founder Lloyd P. Nolen in 1963.

The "Twelve Planes of Christmas" online fundraising campaign also is raising funds for a Boeing N2S Stearman *Kaydet* trainer dedicated to "Rosie the Riveter," the women who worked in factories and shipyards during World War II. The Stearman is nearing completion of fabric work, awaiting an engine. Last year the campaign raised \$15,185 for the Stearman; this year's goal is \$10,000.

The 12 Planes of Christmas campaign to date has raised more than \$300,000 for Airbase Georgia projects over the past three years, with funds earmarked solely for the restoration of specific aircraft.


